Dear Parents/Caregivers

As Term 4 is drawing to a close, when I reflect I wonder where the weeks went. It feels like it wasn't that long ago we were returning to school for 2018.

This term for me commenced during the holidays. I had the opportunity to host a Principal and the Deputy Principal from 'Te Rapa' primary school in New Zealand. This was an opportunity to share our school and the processes we undertake at Safety Bay Primary School and in Western Australia. It was also interesting to discuss the differences of our systems. They were both extremely impressed with the school and the programs we have in place.

Brooke our School Psychologist presented Triple P Teen to a small group of parents. We will run these seminars again next year, I will say that they are well worth undertaking as a refresher or for new ideas on behaviour management for children.

We were privileged to be one of nine schools to be able to undertake NAPLAN testing and only one of two in WA. This provided us with an extra opportunity to test our networks capability. We decided to run our year 2's and 4's through the testing as it provides us with some starting data and these students have been exposed to the online version before undertaking it in May 2019.

2019 School Development Days (student free days) have been set and presented to the School Board. The days are as follows:

- 31st January and 1st February: The Thursday will consist of operational and whole school approaches. The Friday will involve professional learning on Growth Mindset and the Agile Learner. The presenter will be James Anderson, <https://mindfullydesign.com/mindset-works/>
- 18th March: This will be part of our professional learning around Visible Learning. This is about using research based approaches which are effective and is part of our School Business Plan. Due to the professional learning being in high demand we need to book when the company Corwin have dates available.
- 29th April: This will involve the 4th module of KidsMatter being presented to staff.
- 5th Aug: This will be our second professional learning on Visible Learning that is presented by Corwin, again we needed to be flexible in our dates due to the high demand.

I would like to pass on a big thank you to our P&C for all their fundraising efforts. This year they funded the Gemini Net Playground, Year 5 & 6 outdoor table settings, Sound Garden opening launch, rainwater tank, choir shirts, AFL girl jumpers, ribbons for the athletics carnival, sport shed shelving, and funded some of the library reinvigoration project. This thank you also extends to the Safety Bay Community who attended events, purchased items and tickets. The P&C require new members to keep the great work that they do going in the new year. If you would like to join the P&C in 2019 or find out more about what's involved please come into the office and see me.

As the term draws to a close we farewell some amazing staff members. Annie Klauz (Pre-Primary) and Monali Billimoria (Year 1) who are both heading to other schools. Amanda Parr (Pre-Primary and Year 2) and Margaret Aislabie (Year 5) as their contracts finish but, I am sure they will be back next year in some capacity. There has been a restructure to the Learning Support Classroom after some intensive analysis and research with our Learning Difficulties Team, so we will also farewell Sue Jackson.

At the beginning of 2019 we will be welcoming Mr McKay back to Safety Bay Primary School. As my time as Acting Principal draws to an end, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the staff, students and parents for all your support during my six months. I have enjoyed the challenge that the position has brought and could not have done this without the support of the Team at Safety Bay Primary School.

We would like to take this opportunity to welcome all the new families, that are attending Transition Day tomorrow, at Safety Bay Primary School.

Wishing you all a safe Christmas and look forward to seeing our returning families in 2019.



The students have been working in small groups doing investigations about different forms of physical science. The Pre-Primary students have been learning about how things move and have done an investigation to see if they could get a raw egg to bounce. The year ones have watched sprinkles dance on glad wrap to learn about sound and vibrations. The year 2 students have learnt about pulleys, levers and different types of push pull forces. In year 3 we wanted to see if heat really was a form of energy and not just another word for temperature.



The year 5 and 6 classes were busy learning about light and circuits in cooperative learning groups. The year 5s enjoyed investigating refraction and reflection and were intrigued by the disappearing bowl. They also used the pic collage app to demonstrate their understanding of translucent, transparent and opaque.

VISIBLE LEARNING

This term teachers and students at Safety Bay Primary School have continued working on having a WALT (learning intention) and WILF (success criteria) for every lesson. Students are beginning to understand the purpose of the lesson and they can follow the steps to successfully attain the learning intention. They can answer the question of 'What am I learning?' 'Why am I learning that?' and 'How will I know that I learnt it?' Teachers are using explicit oral and written feedback to ensure that every student is aware of their progress. Students have been busily setting goals to constantly improve and grow. Teachers have continued to reflect on their lessons and are consistently evaluating their impact on the learning process. There is a noticeable change in the mindset of teachers and students. We are collectively working towards creating a culture of **GROWTH MINDSET** in every classroom.

The Effective Teaching committee has worked hard to create an implementation document which provides the school with a clear direction for 2019. This document outlines a timeline for the implementation and the professional learning opportunities for teachers to support them with implementing Visible Learning across the school. Our first whole school professional learning session has been scheduled for the beginning of 2019. This session will focus on 'Building and Developing Visible Learners' and 'Feedback That Makes Learning Visible'. We are very excited and we look forward to embarking on our new Visible Learning implementation journey!

Growth Mindset



The Effective Teaching committee has been granted access to 'Leading the Growth Mindset Teacher' online training and resources by James Anderson. These resources support teachers with understanding the concept of growth mindset and creating a culture of reflection and growth in their classroom.

James Anderson is a speaker, author and educational leader. He is passionate about supporting schools and teachers to enable students to thrive in a rapidly changing, increasingly complex and highly challenging world. The foundation of James's work is the Growth Mindset. He takes teachers beyond simple social media catchphrases to create a teaching framework that develops robust, enduring Growth Mindsets in their students.

Why do we need to have a Growth Mindset?

According to James Anderson, the students of today face problems fundamentally different to those of the past: climate change, population growth and the depletion of natural resources. He firmly believes solving these problems requires students to not only be better thinkers – they need to be more agile thinkers. This means we not only need to ensure students know they are capable of improving their intelligence, we need to teach them how – through Learning Agility.

You don't have to go far today before someone starts talking to you about the need to prepare our children for the future. Children in our schools will change not only jobs, but careers, multiple times. They will be using technologies that haven't been invented to solve problems that don't yet exist.

As educators, it is our job to prepare our young people for this ever-changing world. We are aware of the need to develop "21st-century learners", and we know that it is no longer enough to teach children what they need to know for life in a predictable world. So, preparing students for a world of change and disruption means we must teach them what to do when they don't know what to do. In response to this, there has been a shift away from teaching the "hard facts" to teaching the "soft skills".

Rather than teaching children what to think, we have been asked to teach students how to be better thinkers!

LITERACY

Our staff literacy committee has focused on leading writing improvement during the second semester. A small team of staff attended a three day 'Leading writing improvement workshop' at the Department's Statewide Services building in Padbury.

The sessions were very interesting and motivating, helping us to see where we might be able to plan for future improvements in our school. We covered topics such as data collection and use, using reading skills to link to writing, improving spelling and grammar skills and how to teach genre features with clarity and purpose.

We enjoyed all of the sessions, especially where we could be creative ourselves. We wrote poetry and descriptions, learning a few new strategies that will help us to engage our students in challenging and enjoyable ways.

Our teaching and learning year is rapidly disappearing but our teaching team is thinking forward to 2019. We have continued to plan for ways to support our students and colleagues with information, resources and inspiration so that the new year will commence with renewed enthusiasm.

DANCE CONCERT 2018

I have always believed that as educators we need to be aware of the whole child. Teaching is an important role that I do not take lightly. I know I am there to help children believe in themselves so that in the future they can achieve whatever they want. Dance has provided me with a tool to encourage the growth mindset. When I first teach children in Year 4 I am aware that some children have no intention of enjoying Dance and they put up every obstacle in their way to insure they don't learn. My objective is to break down these barriers and teach children how to firstly enjoy Dance, secondly learn steps and thirdly do that really scary thing and perform in front of the whole school!

Every year the children surprise me, I start off with a group that does not work very well as a team. By the end of that year, every class performs at the Dance Concert. I still can't believe how brave some of the children are. They overcome so much to enable them to perform. Some children have trouble getting on with others, Dance teaches them that everyone has an opinion and that their opinion matters. Some children are fraught with anxiety and performing on stage is one of the scariest things they can do. I believe if they can perform on stage, this gives them the resilience to achieve in life and reminds them that they CAN overcome obstacles in their way. Dance also teaches them about order and what comes next, some children have order processing issues and Dance helps them with their organisation. Dance also teaches students about feelings, I asked my Year 2s about what was their favourite Dance when they watched the Dance Concert. Eka said that she really liked Frozen because it made her sad and it reminded her of her Grandfather that passed away. We really don't know as educators how we affect children, I was so pleased that Eka found something out about herself when she watched the Dance Concert.



Tackling back-to-school anxiety (Beyond Blue website)

The hot, sticky weather has reached its sweaty peak and you're being bombarded with stationery and uniform adverts. It can only mean one thing: the holidays are almost over and it's time to head back to school.

Starting a new school year can be an exciting time, but also an [anxious](#) one. Lots of kids – and their parents – feel nervous in the buildup to their first day back. This is really common, but that doesn't make it any less stressful! Having your child attend school for the first time or starting a new school can create even more [anxiety](#). Preparation is key to dealing with situations where there are lots of unknowns. The more things feel familiar and controlled, the more your child or young person can relax and feel confident about what's happening.

Here are some strategies and tips to make the transition back to school a positive experience.

For primary school kids

- Get back into the school-day routine at least a week early – waking up, eating and going to bed at regular times.
- Get your child involved in planning out their lunches and snacks for the first week back.
- For anxious kids, plenty of detail can be calming. Talk through the steps of getting to their classroom: "And then we hang up our bag on our hook; we say hi to our friends; we find our seat...etc"
- Stick to familiar routines as much as possible. Try to have a calm evening and allow more time to settle before bedtime if your child is feeling excited or nervous about school.
- Help your child pack their bag the night before. A visual checklist can help them remember what they need to take. Lay out their clothes so everything's ready for the morning.

Allow some extra time to get ready on day one so you're not rushing.

For teenagers

The same benefits of setting a routine apply whether you're five, 15 or 50. Encourage your teen to take responsibility for getting back into the swing of things the week before school starts, which unfortunately means an end to any late-night Xbox marathons.

Help your young person set some realistic, achievable goals for the year.

Talk through any issues or fears they might have – whether these are about friends, grades or teachers. Instead of focusing on hypothetical 'what ifs', try and steer them towards 'what is'...and what they can do to change the situation.

Have a couple of practice runs at getting to school together, especially if your young person is going to be using public transport on their own. They're not going to want you cramping their style when school starts, so make sure they're feeling confident about doing the trip solo.

Starting school for the first time?

Sending your little one off to 'big school' can be daunting – for parents as much as kids.

As well as the tips for primary school children above, you could try some of the following strategies:

- Have a few 'dry runs' of the trip to and from school so your child is familiar with the route and what to expect.
- Set up some playdates in the holidays with local kids who are also starting school so they see some familiar faces on day one.
- Visit the school – check out the playground, find their classroom and have a wander round so they can get used to where things are.
- Invent a fun routine to make saying goodbye a bit easier – try a high-five, bear hug or secret handshake.
- Talk positively about the day ahead on the way to school and remind your child where you'll be at pick-up time.
- Drawn-out goodbyes can be upsetting, especially if other kids are getting emotional. Once your child is settled in their classroom, give them some final positive reassurance and beat a hasty retreat.
- Try to limit other activities during the first few weeks – the transition to school can be tiring and kids need down time.
- Schedule a family celebration or a Skype call from grandparents on the weekend to mark the milestone – after all, starting school is a pretty big deal!

And finally, check your own behavior

The start of the school year can be a nervous time for parents as much as kids, but it's important to try and keep your own anxiety levels under control. The more you can stay calm and present school as a fun, positive experience – rather than a necessary evil – the better.

Should I be worried?

It can take a few weeks for kids to adjust to their new class, make friends and get to know their teachers. Children starting a new school can also feel a sense of loss at having to leave their familiar environment behind.

If you notice changes in your child's behaviour lasting beyond the first couple of weeks, speak to school staff about your concerns.

“LETS TAKE A STAND TOGETHER”

Dear Parent/carer

We believe every child has the right to be safe at school. We provide learning environments that foster good behaviour and respect for your children and those around them.

Fortunately, most students attending public schools in Western Australia are able to learn in safe and supportive environments. At times, though, some students can be physically aggressive. This is never acceptable as it can cause psychological and physical harm to those involved, as well as disruption to teaching and learning.

The State Government has released a [Statement](#) to address violence in schools. It sets out 10 actions to help school staff, families and communities work together on this complex issue. Programs and resources will be available for parents to support their children and where appropriate parents and staff will work closely to ensure their children maintain positive behaviour at school.



It is important to understand that these changes focus on students who have intentionally been physically aggressive towards others. Students with a disability who either cannot manage their behaviour or do not intend to harm others are not the target of this plan.

As parents, you also play a vital role. Your children benefit from you modelling and rewarding positive behaviour. I look forward to your ongoing support to keep our school a safe place for all.
