Principal's Word

I am sure all parents are aware of just how difficult things are in terms of finances at the moment and the school certainly needs to become more conscious of spreading out events and payments. As parents you are able to make decisions about the types of activities and events you may wish to involve your child in and with. The disappointing aspect to the school finances is the percentage of parents who don't pay their voluntary contributions. Less than 50% of parents have paid their contributions so far this year. This means we have not received \$22 059 worth of funding toward the school. Since the new school has been built, the school has missed out on over \$100 000 worth of funding that teachers could have utilised in classrooms for student learning. If you are unsure if you have paid your voluntary contributions, don't hesitate to contact the office to ask. Every cent makes a difference.

Cross Country

In the last newsletter I mentioned the students were competing in the Interschool Cross Country. Well they not only competed extremely well, they won. The most impressive thing about the day was the way the children ran and pushed themselves right to the end. We had a large proportion of the competitors overtaking other runners in the straight which helped the team and therefore us to win. Mrs White spent a lot of time organising and preparing the children through 'Runners Club', which obviously worked. Well done Mrs White and the team.

P&C Meeting

I would like to thank and congratulate the P&C for the work they are doing and have done for the students in this school. The time and effort put in by these individuals, ably led by President Jill Erikssen, is extensive and they do it very willingly. You can assist by simply being a member and helping out with events during the year. Many hands make light work.

Art Exhibition

Over the last fortnight, the students have been displaying art work at the Art Exhibition Centre in Kent Street Rockingham. This was a P&C instigated program organised and coordinated by Carmen McSporran and Viv Blycha, members from our P&C. They have been supported extensively by Tamara Toghill, Jill Erikssen, Elleke Bosworth and others who have provided time during the exhibition. I can't thank the ladies enough for the extensive work they have undertaken and the brilliant presentation. I know the children are so very proud of what they have created, which they should be. Mr White, Mrs Langeard as well as the Kindy and Pre Primary teachers assisted the students with their presentations. The exhibition, which we have some photos of in the newsletter, looked so professional and those of you who have had the opportunity to attend would support this I'm sure. The paintings are able to be purchased for \$10 by parents. They would be great to own as a keepsake or as a present for other family members. Those not purchased will be displayed on the Learning Journey next week (September 3rd) and can still be purchased through the P&C. The hope is that enough will be sold to cover the cost of the event. Any extra funds will be put toward the installation of a school fence around our oval at the northern end of the school.

Safety Bay Playground Project

This program, which has been strongly supported by our P&C, has been implemented for the early year students. It has been very successful so far and the children have been designing, building, creating and playing using all sorts of equipment. The students are engaged in play and have come up with some fantastic ideas. We continue to build on the type of equipment provided and the number of students participating. Mrs Allen, Mrs Casey and the KidsMatter team have done an outstanding job in providing for the students in Years 1 and 2 at Safety Bay Primary School.

Learning Journey

Next Thursday the school will be holding a Learning Journey which we hope will become an annual event on the school calendar. It is to be on Thursday 3rd from 5:00pm to 7:00pm. Parents are invited to visit their child's classroom to view the work as well as watching a leader ball display (parents v students if we can get enough volunteers) and Choir and Dance performances. I need to emphasise with all parents and carers that this is **NOT** a time for teacher interviews. Your child will show you their work and discuss this with you. You will be provided with a reflection sheet to complete and can indicate if you would like an interview at a later date. The Year 6 students will run a sausage sizzle and sell drinks to help raise funds for their school camp in term 4. We look forward to seeing as many parents as possible on the day.

Eating out

- Takeaway foods can make life much easier when you are on holidays, stretched for time or haven't been able to do the grocery shopping. Some takeaways are high in fat and salt. When choosing takeaways, use it as an opportunity to educate your children about why you have made a healthier choice.
- ⇒ Some food outlets offer 'upgrades' to larger serves. Think before you order and decide if you really need a larger meal and the extra kilojoules, fat and sugar that come with it.
- ⇒ Avoid ordering the same foods at lunch from the canteen or only eating your favourite foods.
- ⇒ There are heaps of healthier takeaway options to choose from. Try sushi, pita wraps, baked potatoes, souvlaki, kebabs, vegetable or seafood pizzas, tabouli, falafels, steamed rice with vegetables, baked chicken, grilled fish and steamed dim sims.
- Healthier desserts include fruit salad and fruit smoothies.

Supporting children to cope with stress

Children who cope better with life's everyday setbacks develop good mental health and wellbeing. Some ways adults can support children's developing coping skills include:

Optimising children's positive experiences

Keep stress within a manageable everyday range.

Arrange opportunities for 'ups' that involve fun, joy, and pleasure which provide a bank of positive emotions to buffer against life's everyday 'downs' that most involve hust disappointment front tolerance. that may involve hurt, disappointment, frustration or conflict.

Helping children develop optimism

Children learn by observing others. Show them how to be optimistic by your own attitude and what you say when things go wrong for you.

Look for solutions and avoid blaming others or

yourself.
Give children opportunities to succeed.

Give realistic praise and encouragement.

Helping children to reframe their unhelpful thoughts, feelings and behaviours into helpful ones

Help children turn setbacks into a drive to try again

Help children to think positively. For example, "I know that puzzle was hard today, but yesterday I saw you get a hard puzzle out. You kept trying until you found the right place to put the pieces."

Reconnection and repair when things go wrong

When things go wrong between parents and carers and a child, the most important thing to do is to reconnect and repair the relationship. This is not only essential for the child's mental health and wellbeing but also enables them to learn to deal with relationship problems.

It may not be possible to reconnect right at the time because of strong feelings, but as soon as you can, offer a hug and some words to show that you understand and

accept how the child felt.

HAPPY principlesThe HAPPY principles also offer some ways to help your child have an optimistic outlook and are outlined in the table below:

2015 RASSA CROSS COUNTRY

Chilly but fine conditions greeted our team of nervous, but eager participants at this year's annual cross country event held at the rugby grounds and surrounding walk tracks at Lark Hill on Wednesday, 12th August.

It was a huge event once again – with all 12 schools in the RASSA organisation in the Rockingham area represented at the carnival. This meant that there were up to **100** children in each race – an amazing spectacle at the start of the races. The Lark Hill course is a very challenging one - requiring the children to run up and down hills, some parts on a rocky or gravel surface. All of our participants did a superb job running as well as they could.

Points for the first four runners over the line for each school in each race are added together to determine who is the champion cross country school, as well as the top team for each year level. There were some amazing individual and team efforts which resulted in our school finishing FIRST overall this year - an impressive achievement in a hugely competitive field! It was a tight competition, with the win only being 1 point in front of Port Kennedy.




