Principal's Word

Communication

Yesterday you received a letter regarding the *possibility* of a restructure occurring. The plan is that we have made alternative arrangements to support the students and teachers in those classrooms. We are aware some students will be leaving during this time and we are investigating enrolments who have moved out of the area. You will be kept informed.

I have had some concerns raised regarding communication from the school to parents. When a program is busy, and by that I mean school, family and community, it is imperative that communication between school and home (and vice versa), is maintained at a consistent and effective level. The newsletter is emailed to each family (if we have an address) and it is put on the school website so every family can access it easily. If you do not have computer access, the Safety Bay library provides community members access to their computers if you join. Reading the newsletter keeps you informed. With a busy program comes responsibility on the part of each child to ensure notes get home and if the notes involve permission from parents to attend or participate, the child's responsibility is to ensure the parent gets the note. We do not want to see children miss out on opportunities, so please take the time to explain to your child their responsibility.

At this time of year meetings have been organised so parents can receive information about teacher's plans for the year in their class. If you have been unable to attend, please seek an appointment with your child's teacher as early as possible in the term as possible.

As part of Safety Bay Primary School's focus on improving Literacy for all students, we are continuing to run a program called MultiLit. This stands for Making Up Lost Time In Literacy. MultiLit is an intensive word attack and reading program designed to improve children's progress in reading and comprehension.

We are very enthusiastic about this program, as research has shown that children can make up to 18 months gain in their reading progress, in two school terms.

The program is delivered by volunteer tutors who are trained in the program. Each child attends 3 – 4 x 30 minute sessions per week. To enable the program to continue successfully, we require the assistance of more volunteers. If you have 30 minutes to spare per week, on a regular basis, then we would love to hear from you. HAVE YOU PAID?

Voluntary Contributions payments are due now. Thank you those families who have already paid. While contributions are voluntary, the quality of our teaching and learning program will be maximised when each family contributes to funding gained from other sources, including the State government, via the student-centred funding model and Commonwealth governments. A voluntary contribution of \$60 per student per year (\$40 per Kindy student) is payable, or just over \$1 per week.

At Safety Bay Primary School voluntary contributions are used toward purchasing supplementary materials and resources to be used in the classroom as follows:- Art & Craft materials, Society & Environment, Literacy, Science, Numeracy, Information Technology Resources and Physical Education Resources.

Starting school is a big change for children

Not only do they have to cope with schoolwork and teachers, but they also have to get used to being part of a class and a whole school. A lot more is expected of children when they start school and there are lots more people to get on with. It helps children to know that there are people at school who will look after them and care about their needs.

Belonging improves mental health, wellbeing and learning

All children need to feel that school is a safe place where people will care about them, where their needs for support, respect and friendship will be met, and where they will be able to get help to work out problems. When these needs are met children develop a sense of belonging at school. Belonging is very important for children's mental health and wellbeing. Children who feel that they belong at school are happier, more relaxed and have fewer behavioural problems than other students. They are also more motivated to learn and be more successful with their school work. Research into children's mental health has found that a sense of belonging and connectedness at school helps to protect children against mental health difficulties and improves their learning.

Making friends and having positive relationships with teachers helps children develop a sense of belonging at school. Having older 'buddies' to turn to helps younger children feel that school is a place where they can get help if they need it. Looking after younger children encourages caring and helping in older children and helps to reduce conflicts and bullying. These are some of the ways that children's sense of belonging at school can be supported.

More ways schools can help create a sense of belonging

As part of KidsMatter Primary, schools look closely at ways they can continue to build strong positive relationships with all students and families. This includes things like:

- making the school environment welcoming for all students and families
- encouraging teachers to get to know all their students and their families
- identifying ways of improving communication with families
- focusing on child and family strengths
- making sure that school policies on safety, welfare and discipline are clearly communicated and support a sense of belonging for children and families.

What parents and carers can do?

Parents and carers can work with school staff to help create a bridge between home and school. When the adults responsible for children take a positive interest in what happens at school it helps children feel at home. It also makes it easier to pick up any problems early when they are easiest to resolve. KidsMatter continued.....

- Find out about the school and what your child is learning; participate in information sessions
- Make time to listen to your child tell you about what he or she is doing at school
- Let your child's teacher know if he/she is having difficulties and discuss what kinds of things you can do at home and school to help.
